

"The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing 9 shall want." Psalm 23:1



First Reading: Ezekiel 34:11-12, 15-17

On this last Sunday of the liturgical year, the Church turns its attention to that time when life as we experience it on earth ends and eternal life begins. This Reading announces that the Lord will come in person to tend his flock. The hopelessly lost, those incapable of finding their own way back, and those who went astray, he will search for until he finds them and brings them back. The "shattered." he will bind up. The weak or sick he will make strong again. The Lord will tend to the well-being of all the flock, seeing that they get what they need and deserve. God's people like their leaders, will be judged for their covenant fidelity.

Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 15:20-26, 28

In this Reading, Paul teaches that Christians faith and hope are based on Jesus' being raised from the dead. He calls Christ the first fruits of those who have "fallen asleep." In this passage, the first fruits are not so much an offering as a pledge or guarantee of "the crop" of believers who will be harvested at the end of time. Paul's comparison of Adam with Christ is of the first man, who represents all humanity, with the last man, who is Christ. The first man must die, but the last man died and was raised up from the dead—as will be all those who are baptized into him.

Gospel: Matthew 25:31-46

This Gospel Reading concludes Jesus' discourse about the end times. In it, the Lord, who is referred to as the Son of Man, a shepherd, and a king, presides over the final judgment "of the nations." The metaphor that Jesus chooses for this reckoning is a shepherd separating animals at the end of a normal day in the Mideast. The mixed flock of goats are a common sight. Both animals are useful. The sheep provides wool and for clothing, the goats the dietary staples of milk and cheese. In this parable, for whatever reason, the sheep represent those who will enjoy eternal life and the goats those who will suffer eternal punishment. There is lack of clarity, however, about the criteria for the judgment. Called today "the corporal works of mercy, the list is repeated four times. Each repetition reinforces Jesus' insistence that how people treat others, especially those in need, is how they will treat him.

Throughout the month of **November**, we shall remember and pray for our beloved dead. A **Book of Remembrance** is placed on the church table for anyone to inscribe the names of their deceased and we'll pray for them at every Mass throughout the month. Other ways to honor them include lighting candles for them *(there are two candlestands at the back of the church)*, visiting their graves and praying and offering Masses for them. You can also bring their pictures and post them on the **Memorial Board**. *Offering Envelopes* are placed on the church table for your use in memory of the dead.

PRAYERS AND PRACTICES FOR REMEMBERING THE DEAD DURING THE MONTH OF NOVEMBER

Throughout the last weeks of the Roman Catholic liturgical year, the Church reminds us of the *"end times"* with particular eschatological readings which refer to the coming of the Lord and the unpredictability of death. This year, the world has been especially visited by death. At this writing, the coronavirus pandemic has taken over 1,154,068 lives worldwide – about 4000 per day. In the United States, we have reached over 224,339 deaths. These are not empty statistics; these are very



ed States, we have reached over 224,339 deaths. These are not empty statistics; these are very real children of God who were loved and valued and will be missed by those who knew them. Therefore, this year, let us be even more attentive to prayer. Let us be mindful of the power of the liturgy to transform the lives of those who participate in it. Let us draw from our rich treasury of orations and Scripture in order to give comfort to our people. Most of all, let us commend the Dead to the merciful embrace of almighty God. May these prayers increase our faith and console those who mourn.



POPE FRANCIS EXTENDS INDULGENCES THROUGHOUT NOVEMBER 2020

PLENARY INDULGENCE DURING MONTH OF NOVEMBER: Due to the coronavirus pandemic and the need to avoid large groups, the Plenary Indulgence applicable to the deceased by those who visit a cemetery has been extended beyond the normal dates of <u>November 1-8</u>. This year, the indulgence can be obtained by anyone who visits a cemetery, even if only mentally, on any day in November, and devoutly prays for the faithful departed. PLENARY INDULGENCE FOR FEAST OF ALL SOULS' DAY: Regarding the Plenary Indulgence attached to All Souls' Day, this year, it can be obtained not only on the preceding or succeeding Sunday, or on the actual Feast day, but on any other day of the month chosen by each member of the faithful. In this case, the indulgence is obtained by *"devoutly visiting a church or an oratory"*, along with the recitation of the *Our Father* and the *Creed*, and the other requirements associated with a Plenary Indulgence.

THE HOMEBOUND: For anyone who cannot leave their home for various reasons, including Covid restrictions, they too can obtain the Plenary Indulgence by *"uniting themselves spiritually to other members of the faithful"*. In this case, the condition of being *"completely detached from sin"* and the intention of completing the other requirements for obtaining a Plenary Indulgence remain. These conditions are Sacramental Confession, reception of Holy Communion and a prayer for the Holy Father's intentions. The Decree suggests that such prayer take place before an *"image of Jesus or the Blessed Virgin Mary"*. Among the various prayers that are recommended are *"prayers for the deceased, Morning or Evening Prayer from the Office of the Dead, the Rosary, the Divine Mercy Chaplet, meditating on various Gospel passages proposed for the liturgy of the Dead, or completing a work of mercy by offering to God the suffering and discomforts of one's own life."* Directing a word to priests, the Decree asks that they make the Sacrament of Confession generously available and that they make Holy Communion available to the sick. In addition, all priests are invited to offer three Masses on All Souls' Day. [Adapted from an article by *Sr. Bernadette Mary Reis, FSP* for the Vatican News]

*Subject: INVITATION TO RETURN TO MASS AND EXTENDED DISPENSATION FROM OBLIGATION

To: All Members of the Diocese of Honolulu From: Bishop Larry Silva Date: October 13, 2020

Aloha, Sisters and Brothers! Peace be with you!

This year of 2020 has brought us many unprecedented experiences and major adjustments to our lives and livelihoods due to the coronavirus pandemic. While we must not let down our guard and continue to observe prudent hygiene measures, we also want to look optimistically to the future. With Advent and Christmas coming, it is very important that we prepare ourselves well for these high holy days in which we celebrate the great gift of the Word of God taking flesh and dwelling among us. Therefore, I ask all the parishes to plan their Advent and Christmas schedules in such a way as to accommodate as many people as possible throughout these days.

Since mid-March through October 31, 2020 I have issued a dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays in order to prevent the spread of COVID-19. I am hereby extending that dispensation from the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation through **December 31, 2020**. As I do so, however, I urge everyone who is able to return to Mass, without undue risks to their health or the health of others, to do so. Please note that in the Diocese of Honolulu, besides all Sundays, the holy days of obligation are the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception on Tuesday, December 8; and Christmas on Friday, December 25. Again, while all are dispensed from the obligation of attending, I urge you to do so if you can.

It is highly recommended that those who do avail themselves of the dispensation substitute some other prayer experience so that worship of God does not lose its primary focus in our lives. One could do a home holy hour, pray the rosary, celebrate the Liturgy of the Hours, or do some reading of spiritual books and articles, especially the lives of the saints. Of course, we also encourage anyone who cannot attend Mass to watch a live-streamed Mass. Sites are posted on our diocesan website at <u>www.catholichawaii.org</u>.

We encourage everyone to reach out to those who may not hear this message on their own and invite them to "Come, let us adore him, Christ the Lord!

Aloha,

Governor David Y. Ige's latest FOURTEENTH PROCLAMATION RELATED TO THE COVID-19 EMERGENCY signed on October 13, 2020 (Exhibit H) directs *"any cemetery, cemetery authority, mortuary, mortuary authority, or person engaged in the provision of funeral services or who embalms bodies is prohibited from transporting a body to a residence or any other location, unless it is the location of burial authorized by law."*

Therefore, effective immediately and until further notice, all Funeral Masses in the presence of a body (casket) in the state of Hawaii are to be postponed OR celebrated without the presence of the body.

Our clergy can still offer the Vigil for the Deceased and/or a Funeral Liturgy outside Mass at the mortuary/ funeral home, or a Committal Service at the cemetery. As an <u>exception</u> during this time, a Funeral Mass at church in the presence of an Urn or without the presence of the body may still be celebrated before the Committal. In that case, the body should be blessed with holy water at the cemetery, and the Final Commendation and Farewell should be included in the Committal Service (See Order of Christian Funerals, Chapter 6.) STEWARDSHIP > PSALMS OF PRAISE & THANKSGIVING

November 26 | Very soon Americans will celebrate the Thanksgiving holidays. Even during these uncertain times, we will have the urge to gather for sumptuous meals highlighted by turkey and pumpkin pie, traveling to and from the ancestral home, enjoying family, feasting on leftovers and perhaps even watching football. For many of us, Thanksgiving Day is so full of activity that there is a tendency to forget what's at the heart of Thanksgiving, offering our thanks to God for the many gifts that have been bestowed upon us. Although sometimes the reason for the holiday is forgotten in our secular culture today, good stewards of their life



and faith recognize that Thanksgiving should be directed primarily in God's direction.

Thanksgiving Day is a uniquely special holiday for most Americans, where we celebrate family unity. Good stewards approach this holiday with a deep sense of prayer, gratitude and joy. They are reminded that their lives and daily activities are a constant act of thanksgiving, all of which give glory to God, especially through the celebration of the Eucharist.

The Thanksgiving holiday is an excellent time to rediscover the psalms of praise and thanksgiving. When you find a quiet moment, sit and relax with your Bible. Think of a time when awe and gratitude overwhelmed you. Maybe it was a sunrise, or children playing in a park, an inspirational hymn at Mass, a family gathering, or a walk in the woods. Remember how you appreciated that special moment. Then, open your Bible to one of the psalms of thanksgiving and recite it to yourself. Take Psalm 118 for instance: *"Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his love endures forever."* Listen to the words. Close your eyes. Let the psalm speak to you. Other psalms of praise and thanksgiving you might consider include Psalms 92, 95, 98, 100, 103, 104,105, 107, 111, 117, 145, and 147. Whatever psalm you choose for that quiet moment, thank God for that special time of awe as well as all the good things in your life, and praise God for his glorious deeds.

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A STEWARDSHIP PRAYER



FACE – Faith Action for Community Equity FAITH ACTION'S ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE TASK FORCE

Faith Action's Environmental Justice Task Force and Blue Planet Foundation co-authored an *"Island Voices"* article that was published in the Star-Advertiser on Nov. 11. Entitled, *"Council should make city walkable, with right-sized parking,"* the article is about Bill 2, which is currently being considered by the Honolulu City Council. As introduced, the bill would, over time, restructure Honolulu's urban landscape to make it more environmentally sustainable.

Bill 2, unamended, would have its greatest effects in densely populated areas, encouraging housing to be located within easy walking distance of shops, restaurants, child-care, fitness facilities, health care, and social service agencies. The bill would reduce the current requirements for parking stalls since many are not used. The bill encourages walkable neighborhoods that minimize the need for driving.

Environmental organizations supported Bill 2 in the form in which it was introduced. Development interests, however, want to make substantial amendments to the bill that would minimize its environmental benefits.
