Pastor's Corner

Next Sunday's Reading

The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph

First Reading Genesis 15:1-6; 21:1-3 Responsorial Psalm Psalm: 105:1-9

Second Reading

Gospel

Hebrews 11:8, 11-12, 17-19 Luke 2:22-40

First Reading: 2 Samuel 7:1-5, 8-12, 14, 16

This Reading tells that Samuel served as a figure of transition between the period of rule by judges to rule by a king. It was he who was chosen by God to anoint Saul as the first king of Israel and he will do the same for Saul's successor, King David. The transition to a peaceful monarchy was a difficult one, filled with rebellion against God, who wished to be understood as the true king of Israel. His power and wisdom were to be known as everlasting. King David was a successful king who governed with political savvy and strong military skills. Nevertheless, this sense of security leads him to ponder God's place in his success and desires to build a more fitting dwelling place for God. David turns to the prophet Nathan to reveal his plan and Nathan immediately assures him that God will bless his decision. There is no doubt that God is in charge.

Second Reading: Romans 16:25-27

This 16th verse is the last portion of Paul's letter to the Romans authored in Corinth before he traveled to Rome. It contains mostly greetings and encouragement to those in Rome who have responsibility over its infant Christian community. At the end of the letter, Paul adds words to strengthen the sense of authority and calls for an intense vigor to those who will follow the gospel and reveal to the nations the obedience of faith owed to God through Christ Jesus.

Gospel: *Luke* 1:26-38

In this Gospel Reading, Gabriel, whose name means, "God is my strength," appears to Mary and foretells the birth of her Son who "will be called great and will be called the Son of the Most High." Six months earlier Gabriel appeared to Mary's cousin, Elizabeth, who is barren, that she will give birth to a son who is to be called John. These announcements are meant to be seen as God's plan of salvation, the lowly are chosen by God in order to humble the mighty, and the poor are chosen to bear God's message to the rich who are stubborn of heart. Both Mary and Elizabeth fit this description perfectly. Both women cooperate with God's grace with little doubt.. "For nothing is impossible for God." God's plan of salvation is not forced upon us; we must say yes to his designs.

❖ REPAIR & MAINTENANCE

*** HANDICAP BATHROOM – Parish volunteers, Adriano Daligcon and Roger Isidro repaired a leaking toilet bowl in the handicap bathroom by the sacristy and replaced a busted faucet in the rectory kitchen. We are grateful for their kind services.

***CEMETERY ISSUES – The cemetery caretaker, *Kalolo Tuhalafatai*, reported that an old *olo* tree fell to the ground because of strong winds last November. Another tree which is outside the perimeter fence is in danger of following suit. *Kalolo* recommended the cutting of the trees and look for a contractor to cut and dispose off the rubbish. Last week, *Kalolo* found out that the padlocks to the cemetery gate were extruded or removed intentionally by force. They have to be replaced so as to maintain the peace of the spirits resting there. A few days later, on December 15, one side of the gate was rammed and destroyed. *Kalolo* called the police officers to report the incident. He does not only maintain the upkeep of the area but also does some security responsibility and we are very grateful to him.

PARISH STEWARDSHIP (contd)

***SECURITY CAMERAS – To augment security within the church compound, security cameras were purchased by *Fran Kovaloff* and installed as well as synchronized with the internet app by *Lambert Castillo*.

❖CHURCH ENVIRONMENT – Volunteer parishioners come every Saturday to prepare the Church for the weekend Masses. They spruce up the altar with new linens, decorate the sanctuary with flowers, put up the seasonal banners and other cleaning tasks. They set up the proper worship environments and make our celebrations dignified and meaningful. During the time of the covid-19 pandemic, in compliance with the Diocese and government advisory they marked the seating in the pews and communion line for 6-ft distancing as well as place sanitizers for use by the mass-goers and disinfect the church. Included in this dedicated group are Marivic Palting, Nellie Puzon, Bella Miranda, Ador Padilla, Doi Facuri, Gloria Rodrigues, Fran Kovaloff, Aida Isidro, Medy Macalma, Marichu Pe Benito and Corazon Orcino.

Million thanks to Myra dela Cruz who supplies our church with fresh flowers that bedeck the sanctuary.

Linda Puzon and Fran Kovaloff have put up and decorated the Christmas tree in the Rectory while Doi Facuri and Mark Correia installed the Christmas lights and garlands in the rectory as well as around the church and other structures. The father and son tandem of Alvin & Adam Baron teamed up to ready the Nativity creche inside the church. Roger Isidro hang a white lantern on the façade of the Pastoral Center, and it gleams like a star that brightens the night. They surely enliven the otherwise gloomy atmosphere darkened by the covid pandemic.

❖PRE-CHRISTMAS CLEANING – Parishioner-volunteers have finished cleaning up the church and other living areas. Following the government advisory of avoiding large gatherings, they did their assigned tasks in small groups or by families on different times of the day or days of the week. The *Artates* and *Bacani* families with the *Altar Ladies* worked together on the jalousie windows and interior decors while *Andy & Maryann Llamedo* dusted off the light bulbs. *Marc & Clem Ulep* and their two boys, *Gerald* and *David*, mopped and cleaned the parish hall and the church. The *Knights of Columbus* worked on the KC Conference Room and some parts of the Pastoral Center. The *Finance Council members* cleaned up the kitchen in the parish hall. Thanks to *Maryann Llamedo* who coordinated the pre-Christmas general cleaning.

❖LITURGY - The livestreaming of OLM Sunday Mass at 9:00am for the sake of those sheltered-in during the covid-19 crisis will continue on via the OLM Facebook account and thru the kind services of the *Llamedo family*. The Simbang-Gabi masses will also be live-streamed. The items for power-point projection at Mass include the readings and responses together with sacred graphics. For added health protection, *Andy Llamedo* installed a flexi-glass barrier at the lectern. A new microphone on the lectern has been installed by *Jun Cortez*. His son, *Gene Cortez*, paid for the Shure Microflex microphone in the amount of \$236.17 as his stewardship offering to the Church.

There is a wi-fi hook-up to the parish hall in case of an overflow in the church. This is made possible thru the high-tech know-how of *Jun Cortez* and *Fidel Flores* who also donated and put up wi-fi boosters in the church and hall for wider coverage and for security camera operation. Designated to operate the power-point projection during the Masses are – *Malia Balbuena* at the 6:00pm Saturday Vigil Mass, *Jun Cortez* at the 6:30am Sunday Mass while *Marc & Clem Ulep* and their kids, *David & Gerald*, take care of the 9:00am Mass.

For the power-point slides and peoples' viewing delight in the hall, a new Hisense LED LCD 50" TV unit was recently donated as Christmas gift by *Silverio Palting*. The TV base and support were assembled by *Jun Cortez* & supervised by his faithful co-worker and wife, *Caridad*. The choir loft is also prepared for additional accommodation. In both areas, the faithful can attend the Mass and ministers can go to give Holy Communion to them.

❖GARDENING – There are wonderful people who volunteer with the upkeep of the church grounds. *Clemente Fontanilla* mows the grasses.

Frankie Cabral single-handedly trimmed the overhanging tree branches of the evergreen cypress trees in front of the parish hall and overgrown shrubs around the church then hung the Christmas lights around the trees. He has also put up the usual Christmas lights at the belfry from top to bottom ready to brighten the season.

The couple-tandem of *Lito and Leah Centino* continue to tend and beautify the side of the Hall, Rectory and Pastoral Center with garden plants from their own nursery.

Eddie Lucero and Jun Flores are faithfully keeping the yellow hibiscus blooming with flowers thru regular pruning and watering. Jun & Nida Flores replaced the seasonal flowering plants with African daisies at the foot of the church belfry and along the makai side of the church. God bless them all!





*Subject: INVITATION TO RETURN TO MASS AND EXTENDED DISPENSATION FROM OBLIGATION

To: All Parishioners of the Diocese of Honolulu

From: Bishop Larry Silva Date: December 6, 2020

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Peace be with you!

One of the most difficult decisions I have had to make as a bishop was the suspension of public Masses due to the coronavirus pandemic from mid-March to late May, 2020. Since then, the obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and holy days has been dispensed. In light of the ongoing pandemic, I am extending the dispensation through Tuesday, February 16, 2021, the day before Ash Wednesday.

While I am extending this dispensation for the sake of those who are at higher risk if they should be infected with the COVID-19 virus, I would like to urge all our parishioners who can safely do so to return to worship at Sunday Mass.

Why does the Church put such great importance on our celebration of Sunday Mass that it is a serious obligation for all Catholics to attend every Sunday and Holy Day of Obligation? It is because the Eucharist is our unique physical encounter with our Lord Jesus Christ, who longs to be one with us and to strengthen us for our mission of living in his love and sharing his Good News with others. The Eucharist is not simply a series of rituals in which we engage, but it is the Memorial that Jesus himself left us in which he makes himself present to us. He offers himself to us in a physical manner, hidden under the guise of bread and wine, which by the power of the Holy Spirit invoked by the priest in the midst of his beloved Bride, the Church, become his Body and Blood. Jesus died on the cross for us, rose from the dead, and ascended into heaven. But he is the "living bread come down from heaven," who offers himself as real food and real drink to give us eternal life. (See the Gospel of John, Chapter 6.)

When his disciples first encountered the risen Jesus, it changed them from deserters and cowards into bold proclaimers of his Gospel who found joy even in offering their lives for him. So Jesus wants to encounter us to transform us so that we can proclaim to a world gone astray that he is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Yes, we can encounter Jesus in our private prayer, in reading the Scriptures, in feeding the poor and doing the works of mercy – and we must do these things! – but there is nothing compared to a physical encounter with him in the Eucharist. This is why the Church insists that all its members, whenever they are not legitimately impeded, come together in intimate communion with the Body of Christ in the Eucharist, so that the Body of Christ can renew and transform our world with renewed vigor of the living Christ Jesus.

Yes, under our current circumstances, we do have to make adjustments and live a "new normal." But there is nothing that compares to the great gift of his Real Presence that Jesus offers us in the Eucharist. We look forward to welcoming you back!

RE: LITURGICAL DIRECTIVES FOR THE CHRISTMAS SEASON DURING THE TIME OF PANDEMIC

The following are liturgical directives and reminders that impact all Catholic churches, chapels, oratories, centers, and missions in the Diocese of Honolulu for the Christmas Season during the time of pandemic.

- * The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass is extended through <u>February 16, 2021</u> (Tuesday before Ash Wednesday).
- * <u>SINGING AT MASS</u>: Our latest directive reads: "Singing is now allowed by using ONE instrumentalist and ONE cantor ONLY (both need to wear a face covering at all times). The congregation should <u>continue</u> not to sing at Mass as much as possible. The use of wind instruments is still prohibited.
 - *The use of other "non-wind" instruments (e.g. guitars, violins, drums, piano, organ, etc.) is allowed to be used simultaneously.
- * The use of a <u>small choir is permitted</u> during the Christmas season. If the parish is using a choir, choir members need to follow the rules for indoor singing as directed by the State: ["Any person(s) singing <u>shall maintain physical distancing of at least ten (10) feet from any other person (s) while singing.</u> Members of the same performing group singing may be closer than ten (10) feet together while performing, provided the group consists of less than ten (10) persons. To the extent reasonable and practicable, a physical barrier (e.g., plexiglass) of sufficient size to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 shall separate any person(s) singing from any other person(s), but not including members of the same performing group.]
 - * A distance of 10 feet between the cantor and the congregation needs to be observed as much as possible.
- * In addition to the Entrance, Offertory, Communion and Leave-taking hymns the Kyrie, Gloria, Responsorial Psalm, Gospel Acclamation and the rest of the Mass part responses could be sung during the Christmas season, observing the proper precautions.
- * <u>LITURGICAL PROCESSIONS</u> Entrance and recessional processions from and back of the church are allowed. It is recommended to keep them simple (e.g. clergy and altar servers only).
- * <u>ALTAR SERVERS</u> The use of altar servers at Mass may be reinstated at this time, especially to help with the entrance and recessional processions, use of incense and ringing of the bells during the Mass.
- * <u>RECONCILIATION</u> Parishes can celebrate communal penance services and/or reinstate specified hours for reconciliation as much as possible. Please observe good spacing between the penitent and priest, while at the same time observing absolute privacy for the penitent. Confessions by phone or via the internet are not permitted. General absolution is not permitted.

*REMINDERS FROM PRIOR DIOCESAN DIRECTIVES AND/OR PROTOCOLS:

- * WEARING OF MASK OR MASK/FACE SHIELD In response to the Office of the Governor's "13th Proclamation related to the COVID-19 Emergency" (dated September 22, 2020): "All persons must wear face coverings in compliance with county orders, rules and directives." Our diocesan directive stands as promulgated in our latest MEMO: "Face coverings (masks or mask/face shields) will be worn at ALL times by ALL who participate at the Mass during the liturgical celebration. For those ministers with respiratory issues the use of a face shield instead of a face mask is highly recommended."
- * Priests, deacons and other duly commissioned extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion who are not at high risk of infection themselves may continue to take Communion to the homebound, always exercising proper hygiene procedures and wearing masks.
- * In-person church meetings may continue (with no more than 5 people), <u>IF</u> proper social distancing and the wearing of masks is observed. Otherwise, meetings should continue to be conducted virtually.
- * We encourage parish priests to start/continue live-streaming their liturgies (especially during the Christmas season) to their parishioners via social media platforms and to communicate to them the times of these services and log-in information for their parish's Facebook and/or website. Daily and Sunday Masses are currently being livestreamed from various parishes in our diocese. For a comprehensive and updated list please visit our website at www.catholichawaii.org.
- * <u>FUNERAL SERVICES</u>: In compliance with the Office of the Governor's "14th Proclamation related to the COVID 19 Emergency" (dated October 13, 2020) (Exhibit H) directs "any cemetery, cemetery authority, mortuary, mortuary authority, or person engaged in the provision of funeral services or who embalms bodies is prohibited from transporting a body to a residence or <u>any other location</u>, unless it is the location of burial authorized by law." Therefore, all Funeral Masses in the presence of a body (casket) in the state of Hawaii are to be postponed OR celebrated without the presence of the body.
- * Our clergy can still offer the Vigil for the Deceased and/or a Funeral Liturgy outside Mass at the mortuary/funeral home, or a Committal Service at the cemetery.
- * As an exception during this time, a Funeral Mass at church in the presence of an Urn or without the presence of the body may still be celebrated before the Committal. In that case, the body should be blessed with holy water at the cemetery, and the Final Commendation and Farewell should be included in the Committal Service (See Order of Christian Funerals, Chapter 6.)
- * Religious Education, Youth and Young Adult Ministry and Faith Formation may continue following the proper guidelines provided by the Office of Religion Education and Faith Formation.
 - * All prior memos, directives and protocols are still in effect unless changed in this memo.

The USSCB article reads:

On December 14, Bishop Kevin C. Rhoades of Fort Wayne-South Bend, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Doctrine, and Archbishop Joseph F. Naumann of Kansas City in Kansas, chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Pro-Life Activities, issued a statement on the new COVID-19 vaccines. In their statement, the bishops address the moral concerns raised by the fact that the three vaccines that appear to be ready for distribution in the United States all have some connection to cell lines that originated with tissue taken from abortions.

"In view of the gravity of the current pandemic and the lack of availability of alternative vaccines, the reasons to accept the new COVID-19 vaccines from Pfizer and Moderna are sufficiently serious to justify their use, despite their remote connection to morally compromised cell lines."

"Receiving one of the COVID-19 vaccines ought to be understood as an act of charity toward the other members of our community. In this way, being vaccinated safely against COVID-19 should be considered an act of love of our neighbor and part of our moral responsibility for the common good."


With regard to the AstraZeneca vaccine, the bishops found it to be "more morally compromised" and consequently concluded that this vaccine "should be avoided" if there are alternatives available. "It may turn out, however, that one does not really have a choice of vaccine, at least, not without a lengthy delay in immunization that may have serious consequences for one's health and the health of others," the bishop chairmen stated. "In such a case ... it would be permissible to accept the AstraZeneca vaccine."

At the same time, the bishops also warned that Catholics "must be on guard so that the new COVID-19 vaccines do not desensitize us or weaken our determination to oppose the evil of abortion itself and the subsequent use of fetal cells in
