“Anointing of the Sick in Church — February 12 & 13”

FEAST OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES – FEBRUARY 11

According to **St. Bernadette Soubirous**, the visionary to whom the Blessed Mother appeared, the Virgin Mary proclaimed herself *“The Immaculate Conception.”* The site of the apparition is now a shrine and center for worldwide pilgrimage.

Pope John Paul II designated February 11 as **World Day of the Sick**. In his *Letter Instituting the World Day of the Sick* on May 13, 1992, the Pope wrote that this day is *“a special time of prayer and sharing, of offering one’s suffering for the good of the Church and of reminding us to see in our sick brothers and sisters the face of Christ who, by suffering, dying and rising, achieved the salvation of humankind.”*

Bishop Larry Silva will celebrate the Sacrament of Anointing within the Holy Mass on this day, 12:00pm at the Cathedral-Basilica of Our Lady of Peace.

At OLM, the Anointing of the Sick will be administered in our weekend Masses on February 12 & 13. It is for those who are really sick and for all adults aged 70 and above. Bring your family members, relatives and neighbors for healing and strength.



FEAST OF SAINT BLAISE



Saint Blaise was bishop of Sebaste in Armenia and martyred in the persecution of Licinius in the early 4th century. He is associated with and invoked in the healing of throats. His feast day is February 3.

In memory of St. Blaise, the **Blessing of Throats** with the crossed blessed candles was administered by the priests on his feast day.

At OLM, our priests shall administer the same blessing of throats to the faithful in all the Masses this weekend of February 5 and 6. During Mass, the blessing follows the homily and general intercessions, or for pastoral reasons, it may take the place of the final blessing of the Mass. The formula of blessing is: *“Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness: in the name of the Father, and of the Son, + and of the Holy Spirit.”* This blessing is for everyone, both young and old alike.

First Reading
Jeremiah 17:5-8

Responsorial Psalm
Psalm 1:1-2, 3, 4, 6

Second Reading
1 Corinthians 15:12, 16-20

Gospel
Luke 6:17, 20-26

FOCUS: Listen for God's call and follow the Lord.

In all of today's readings, people hear the Lord calling them to service, and all of them change course to follow their vocation. Young or old, we all have the responsibility to listen for the Lord's direction and answer with enthusiasm, as did Isaiah, Paul, Peter, James, and John.

First Reading: *Isaiah 6:1-2, 3-8*

Isaiah recounts his glorious vision of the Lord and his commissioning.

Second Reading: *1 Corinthians 15:1-11*

Paul reminds the Corinthians of the Gospel he preached to them and lists the resurrected Jesus' appearances, culminating in his own call and conversion.

Gospel: *Luke 5:1-11*

In the Gospel, after preaching from Simon's fishing boat, Jesus tells him to *put out into deep water*. They catch a *great number of fish* and this leads Peter, James, and John to follow Jesus.

THE 2021-2022 APPEAL FOR THE CATHOLIC CHURCH IN HAWAII

UPDATE: HAWAII CATHOLIC HERALD

The latest issue of the *Hawaii Catholic Herald* (January 21, 2022) presents a summary of the remittances of each parish in the Diocese to the *'Ohana in Christ Appeal*.

According to *Mark Clark*, the Diocesan director of stewardship and development, by the end of 2021, the appeal had raised \$582,042 from about 2,000 donors. The set goal is \$1,125,000.00.

Each parish was assigned a target goal of 25% its current annual assessment which is that "tax" it remits yearly to the Diocese to help cover diocesan operations.

Twelve of the Diocese's 66 parishes have already met their goal. OLM is one of them. It actually surpassed its goal of \$10,201.00. From 59 donor-parishioners we raised \$13,458.00. The campaign has five more months to go. It ends on June 30, 2022.

The appeal will support priests' ministry, seminarians and deacon formation, youth & young adult ministry, and service to the poor through the social ministries.

Re: **UPDATED COVID-19 PROTOCOLS FOR CHURCH ACTIVITIES**

Date: **Thu 12/2/2021**

To: **Pastors, Deacons, Ministry Leaders & Parish Office Staff**

From: **Diocesan Covid-19 Task Force**

Effective December 1, 2021, all four counties in the State of Hawaii began relaxing various COVID-19 restrictions. Each county now has the authority to make their own pandemic emergency orders and rules without prior approval by the governor or the director of the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency. However, the Governor has stated that **wearing of masks indoors is still a requirement statewide**.

The protocols and guidance provided here aim to be inclusive of all – without having to disclose vaccination information – in order to encourage participation in the life of the Church while observing the safety and health guidelines set forth by the various counties. Pastors and the faithful should continue to observe sensible health precautions including continued sanitation protocols and hygiene. Thoughtful planning and communication to the parish community should precede the implementation of any changes.

In general, our activities fall under four categories: 1) Spiritual Services (Mass and other forms of public worship/liturgies), 2) Ministries, 3) Meetings, and 4) Social Gatherings.

1. Spiritual Services: Liturgies (Mass, prayer services, and other forms of public worship/liturgies)

There are different capacity allowances for spiritual services:

* Counties of O'ahu, Maui and Kaua'i: 100% church capacity allowed. Proof of vaccination not required. No physical distance requirements, although accommodations are highly recommended for those who are vulnerable to infection.

* Hawai'i Island County: Six feet distancing is still required. Household members may sit together, six feet away from other households/individuals.

The above capacity allowances also apply when using the church for the purpose of preparing persons to receive the sacraments.

* Masks: Masks must be worn at all times by all who participate at the Mass during the liturgical celebration as a mitigation effort.

2. Parish Ministries: In the spirit of synodality, we urge parish leaders to listen to the needs of their parishioners and find creative ways to accompany those who remain hesitant about gathering in-person for parish ministry programs. Ministries including faith formation that use school facilities must comply with applicable infectious disease prevention policies of the school. Similarly, official Associations of the Faithful (such as Catholic Scouting Committee groups) that use parish/school facilities must comply with applicable infectious disease prevention policies of their host parish/school. Associations of the Faithful are listed in the 2021 Directory of the Catholic Church in Hawaii.

* Masks: Masks must be worn while indoors and during interaction with others, whether indoors or outdoors. Household members may be seated together.

* Food: Communal food, potluck, or open food tables and group indoor dining are not permitted. Pre-packaged, take out or individual meals are suggested.

* Faith Formation: There are no changes to the State of Hawaii Department of Health guidelines for classroom settings. Thus, parish faith formation programs (i.e., 3 Eff. 12/2/2021 child/youth/family catechesis, catechumenal process, preparation for the sacraments, etc.) are to maintain COVID-19 processes and protocols currently in place.

* Ministry to the Sick and Homebound: Since this ministry includes entering private homes or health care facilities to offer the Holy Eucharist to health compromised individuals, the Church must take as many precautions as possible. This includes having a fully-vaccinated minister to visit the sick and homebound.

* Outreach and Food Pantries: Parishes providing outreach and food pantry ministries are to maintain COVID-19 processes and protocols currently in place.

* Retreats: Inquire with venue regarding capacity limits and proof of vaccination requirements. Overnight retreats are considered a high-risk activity due to prolonged exposure to attendees. If they must take place, retreat coordinators are to be conscientious regarding issues such as (but not limited to): sleeping arrangements, use and sanitization of shower facilities/bathrooms, meal service/snack and dining facilities, capacity limits and physical distancing requirements for indoor/outdoor activities and group transportation (such as chartered buses), and management of group activities such as singing, socializing, games, etc.

3. Parish Business or Operational Meetings (includes parish advisory councils, business meetings, facility or safety meetings, etc.) Parish business or operational meetings must follow each county's indoor and outdoor maximum restrictions. Social distancing practices should be followed and masks are required indoors.

* The meeting capacity maximums are as follows as of December 1, 2021:

· O`ahu: No indoor or outdoor maximum, however must comply with vaccine/testing requirements if serving food.

· Kaua`i: Indoor maximum 40, outdoor maximum 100

· Maui: Indoor maximum 10, no outdoor maximum

· Hawai`i Island: Indoor maximum 25, outdoor maximum 40 Food: Communal food, potluck, or open food tables and group indoor dining are not permitted. Pre-packaged, take out or individual meals are suggested.

4. Social Gatherings Hospitality and fellowship activities following liturgies, classes, presentations, meetings, etc. are classified by the counties as "social gatherings." Like parish meetings, social gathering rules also have capacity maximums: · O`ahu: No indoor or outdoor maximum, however must comply with vaccine/testing requirements if serving food. · Kaua`i: Indoor maximum 40, outdoor maximum 100 · Maui: Indoor maximum 10, no outdoor maximum · Hawai`i Island: Indoor maximum 25, outdoor maximum 40

* Food: Communal food, potluck, or open food tables and group indoor dining are not permitted. Pre-packaged, take out or individual meals are suggested.

GENERAL INFECTIOUS DISEASE PREVENTION MEASURES

* COVID-19 Exposure: The pastor or his delegate is to immediately report any on-site exposure to COVID-19. Call or text *Dara Perreira*, diocesan Director of Human Resources, at (808) 342-3241. *Ms. Perreira* will instruct the parish on next steps regarding quarantine and return to the workplace/ministry.

* Vaccinations: It is highly recommended that everyone who is eligible be fully vaccinated for COVID-19.

* Consistency in Practice: All employees and volunteers should know what to do when a participant is ill and be well versed with all policies, procedures, and practices regarding the parish's response to the pandemic.

* Signage: Post signs in highly visible locations to promote awareness of the parish's protective measures, policies, procedures, and practices such as proper hand washing, proper wearing of masks, physical distancing, and staying home when sick.

* Stay at Home if Sick: Educate all parents, employees, catechists, and other volunteers about the importance of staying home when sick.

* Checking In: Continue to screen all program participants, catechists, other volunteers, and visitors for general symptoms of illness and have a designated space for those who may need to isolate (never leave a minor unattended.) Process all persons who show signs of illness with the highest levels of confidentiality, dignity, and respect.

* Ventilation: When possible, open windows for greater natural air circulation.

* Avoid Sharing Items: Discourage the sharing of items that are difficult to clean or disinfect. Establish a cleaning schedule for all equipment, materials, and devices that must be shared.

* Separate Personal Items: Ensure that personal belongings are separate from others.

* Hand Hygiene: Encourage participants to frequently wash their hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Adequate healthy hygiene supplies/products should be available such as soap, hand sanitizer, paper towels, tissues, disinfectant wipes, and no-touch/foot-pedal trash cans.

* Cleaning and Disinfection: Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces such as door handles, sink handles, light switches, etc. at least daily or between use as much as possible. Provide guides and schedules of when hands should be washed, and surfaces should be cleaned. All persons should wash their hands before entering the meeting space on any occasion. Restrooms should be checked regularly to ensure soap and towel dispenser are filled.

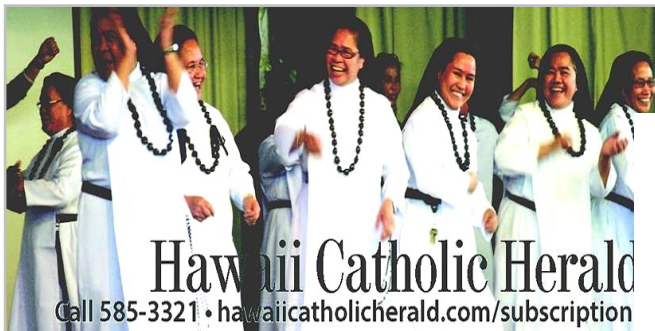
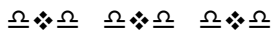


IMPORTANT REMINDERS:

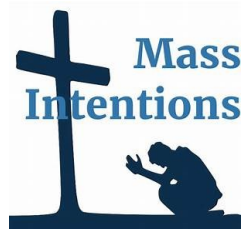

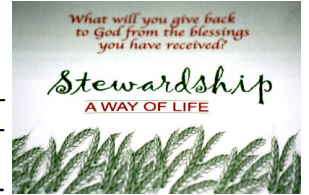
STEWARDSHIP EXPRESSIONS

*THE CHALLENGE OF GIVING BACK TO GOD IN LOVE

(The following excerpt is Part II of a pastoral reflection on stewardship by the Most Reverend Charles C. Thompson, Archbishop of Indianapolis, Indiana, in his series, "Christ the Cornerstone." Part I of this reflection was offered in the January eBulletin.)

"Amen, I say to you, this poor widow put in more than all the other contributors to the treasury. For they have all contributed from their surplus wealth, but she, from her poverty, has contributed all she had, her whole livelihood" (Mk 12:43-44). When our Lord praises the widow for giving "all she had, her whole livelihood" (Mk 12:44), he is commenting on her disposition, or fundamental attitude, toward life. St. Mark gives us no information about this poor widow's situation. We can assume she lives from hand to mouth. It's likely that she has experienced much hardship, disappointment and loneliness. But she is not bitter or angry. She gives freely from the little she has without complaining or holding back. She is generous, as God is generous, giving out of a superabundance of love. We also know nothing about the wealthy donors. If they are anything like the people who give generously to support the work of the Church here in central and southern Indiana, we can assume they are good, honest, charitable people who want to share what they have with others. In all likelihood, these rich people who put large sums into the treasury are also good stewards who give back to God out of gratitude for their many blessings. So what is the point of the story? We might say that the Lord is reminding his disciples (all of us) that how much we give is far less important than its impact on the way we live. If we give whatever is left over, nothing much changes in our lifestyle or in our attitudes toward the people we are helping with our charity. On the other hand, if we give from substance (from our livelihood), we have to make sacrifices, and that always requires a shift in our thinking and our attitude. This does not mean that we can hold back (giving one small coin instead of two). On the contrary, it means that regardless of our wealth (or lack of it), we are challenged to be responsible stewards who are grateful, accountable, generous and willing to give back to the Lord with increase. There's an old Egyptian proverb that says, "As long as your heart is full of love, you always have something to give." Jesus praises the widow's generosity because of the depth of her love. She is recognized as a generous steward because her sacrificial gifts come from a heart overflowing with love. Let's follow her example, giving from substance more than from surplus. Let's pray for the grace to fill our hearts with love and, so, embrace stewardship as a way of life that is far more valuable than money.

**ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE TASK FORCE (EJTF) SUPPORTS CARBON CASHBACK & PROTECTION OF AQUIFER**By *Susan Gorman-Chang*, Chair EJTF

EJTF's mission statement: Our *kuleana* is to protect Hawai'i's natural resources, mitigating and adapting to climate change and ensuring justice for *ka pae 'āina Hawai'i*. (*Ka pae 'āina hawai'i* in the deepest sense refers to the Hawaiian islands as a collective people who also have a responsibility to each other and to the *'āina of Hawai'i* and all of its natural resources.)

This legislative session, the EJTF focuses on mitigating climate change and protecting Oahu's aquifer.

We recognize we all must decrease the amount of carbon put into the atmosphere in order to mitigate destruction caused by climate change. We support House Bill 2278 and Senate Bill 2732 which propose to tax fossil fuels and return the money collected to all Hawaii residents via a tax credit. A University of Hawaii Economic Research Organization (UHERO) study found that an average low-income family would receive \$900 more than it would spend on any increased cost of fossil fuels. The credit is “refundable,” which means even if you pay zero Hawaii state tax, you can still receive the full carbon tax credit! EJTF is supportive of these bills that should incentivize folks to use less fossil fuel AND also soften or remove any further burden for low-income households.

Also a priority is protecting Oahu's aquifer from the any leakage of jet fuel located in tanks just 100 feet above. The task force supports SB 2172 (bit.ly/SB2172) which prohibits future underground fuel storage tanks beginning 7/1/22.

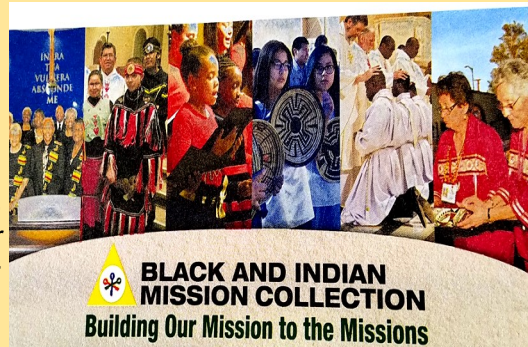

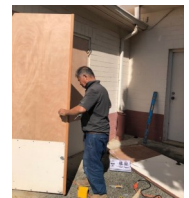
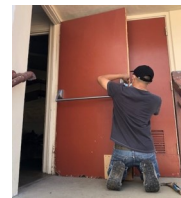
