First Reading: 1 Sirach 27:4-7


Sirach writes of revealing the qualities of things: pottery in a furnace, a shaken sieve, the fruit of a tree, and the speech of a person.

The appeal will support priests' ministry, seminarians and deacon formation, youth & young adult ministry, and service to the poor through the social ministries.

# STEWARDSHIP EXPRESSIONS \*LEADERSHIP INVOLVES A RELATIONSHIP

(This is the fifth in a series of articles by *Dr. Dan R. Ebener* on leading stewardship and evangelization in the Catholic Church. They are based on his book, *Pastoral Leadership: How to Lead in a Catholic Parish*, published by Paulist Press and the Villanova University Center for Church Management. *Dr. Ebener* teaches at St. Ambrose University in Davenport, Iowa.)

Relationships are the stuff of leadership. A congregation is a web of relationships. To practice the people skills needed for leadership, ask yourself: What kind of a human being do I need to become so that I can practice leadership? As Catholics, we are committed to inner change. Jesus calls us to form our hearts out of his love (Luke 10:27). Ashes during Lent are but one example of how we acknowledge that we are committed to change our hearts, our minds and ourselves to become better human beings.

Research shows that we can become compassionate communicators by nurturing an inner silence, being fully present to the moment and listening deeply to others. For Catholics, this entails a rich spiritual life of prayer and reflection on Scripture. Prayer has a powerful effect on the one who prays. It transforms our hearts, our minds and our actions. Leadership is an inside-out activity. It begins with work on the inside and moves toward engaging people on the outside. The formation of the heart is our path to leadership and to holiness. The heart is the place where we can find the quiet of the soul, connect with God and develop the capacity to know, love and serve God and each other – heart to heart – before we can lead each other. Neuroscientists teach that the key to happy, healthy, spiritually fulfilling lives is forming the connections between the heart and the brain. When we actively participate in the Mass, pray the rosary with full consciousness or spend prayerful time in Eucharistic adoration, we strengthen the connections between our head and heart. Scripture teaches us to form our hearts in love, and then to listen to our carefully formed hearts, to be attentive to matters of the heart and intentional about following the message that the Spirit moves into our heart. Forming the heart prepares us for leadership.

RE: **Diocese of Honolulu 2022 Lenten** Regulations

# **FASTING**

In the dioceses in the United States, Catholics aged 18 through 59 are bound to fast on both Ash Wednesday (March 2, 2022) and Good Friday (April 15, 2022).

To fast means to consume one full meal a day at most, although taking of other, smaller quantities of food at the other customary mealtimes is permitted. Food and drink between meals (excepting water and medicine) is not permitted on days of fasting.

# ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT

Catholics aged 14 and up are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, all Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday.

To abstain means refraining from eating beef, veal, pork, or poultry at least, although eggs and milk products are acceptable. The consumption of fish and shellfish is permitted, though the penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

# **EASTER DUTY**

❖ All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year. This precept is to be fulfilled during the Easter Season unless it is fulfilled, for a just cause, at some other time during the year. This period is extended to include all the weeks of Lent and the Easter Season up to Trinity Sunday (June 12, 2022).

# LENTEN PRACTICES

The faithful are encouraged during Lent to attend daily Mass, receive Holy Communion, participate in penance services, and receive sacramental absolution; to take part in public and private exercises of piety, give generously to works of religion and charity, perform acts of kindness toward the sick, aged, and the poor; to practice voluntary self-denial, especially regarding food, drink, and worldly amusements; and to pray more fervently, particularly for the intentions of the Holy Father.

Although we are still in the midst of the pandemic, some of our protocols have lightened since Lent of 2021. These protocols attached may be used, at the pastor's discretion.

Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, falls this year on **March 2**<sup>nd</sup>. Ashes are to be blessed as a sign of our entry into a season of conversion, repentance, and reconciliation. Ashes are to be blessed by a bishop, priest, or deacon. Others may be associated with the clergy in the distribution of ashes.

# **Distribution of Ashes in Time of Pandemic**:

The priest says the prayer for blessing the ashes, then sprinkles the ashes with holy water without saying anything.

Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: "Repent, and believe in the Gospel", or

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Each minister marks the forehead of each parishioner with ashes, saying "Repent, and believe in the Gospel", or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Ministers will sanitize their hands before distribution, then (the ministers) wash the residue ashes off after the last person and then sanitize their hands again.

Funeral Masses may not be celebrated on Holy Thursday, Good Friday, or Holy Saturday, nor on the Sundays of Lent. When pastoral reasons require that a funeral be celebrated on these days, only a Funeral Outside of Mass may be held.

To afford the faithful opportunities to participate in Lenten prayer services, pastors are encouraged to have such prayer services at least twice a week, including the Way of the Cross on Fridays, Exposition and Benediction, Evening Prayer, and evening Masses. A homily or instruction should be included.

### BLESSING OF THE OILS AND CONSECRATION OF THE CHRISM

❖ In order to allow participation of Catholics throughout the islands, the Sacred Oils will be blessed during the Chrism Mass to be celebrated in several locations. All are encouraged to join in one of the following celebrations:

Maui: Thursday, March 24<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m., St. Anthony Church, Wailuku. Tuesday, April 5<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m., Holy Cross Church, Kalaheo.

Big Island: Thursday, April 7<sup>th</sup> at 5:30 p.m., St. Joseph Church, Hilo.

Oahu: Thursday, April 12<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m., Co-Cathedral of St. Theresa, Honolulu.

# THE SACRED PASCHAL TRIDUUM

"Since Christ accomplished his work of human redemption and of the perfect glorification of God principally through his Paschal Mystery, in which by dying he has destroyed our death, and by rising restored our life, the sacred Paschal Triduum of the Passion and Resurrection of the Lord shines forth as the high point of the entire liturgical year" (Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year and the Calendar, #18). Three major liturgical principles may be of help here:

The Triduum may be viewed a single liturgical action that occurs over a period of three days.

The Triduum is not part of Lent, but in its entirety, celebrates the Easter event.

The entire focus of the Triduum is on the Triumph of the Cross and the Resurrection.

# **Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord**

Each parish should plan how it will conduct this opening liturgy of Holy Week with due regard to the safety of all and to the ritual prescriptions in the Roman Missal.

# Thursday of the Lord's Supper

The Roman Missal directs that "After the Homily, where a pastoral reason suggests it, the Washing of Feet follows" (Roman Missal, Holy Thursday, 10). However, due to the current protocols and for pastoral reasons the washing of feet this year <u>may</u> be eliminated during the Triduum, unless the priest washing the feet and those whose feet are to be washed are agreeable to participate in this sacred gesture.

At the end of the Mass of the Lord's Supper the procession with the Blessed Sacrament to the place of repose <u>is to be</u> <u>planned in such a way that current safety</u> <u>measures can be maintained throughout the procession and the hours of Adoration.</u>

# **The Adoration of the Holy Cross – Universal Prayers**

Options contained in the Roman Missal should be selected beforehand

Reverencing by the congregation is to be done by a profound bow or genuflection only. <u>Kissing or touching of the cross should be avoided during the pandemic.</u>

The following prayer will be added to the Universal Prayers (cf. Missale Romanum, pag. 314 n. 13):

# Prayer XI: For special needs of the sick and dead affected by the coronavirus

Let us pray for our world, which has been so radically impacted by the coronavirus crisis; for those who contracted the disease and those who care for them; for medical personnel and researchers; for those who have suffered economically; and for a complete and speedy recovery from this crisis.

## Prayer in silence. Then the Priest says:

Almighty God of all the living, you are our strength and our salvation. Hear and answer our prayers for all affected by this crisis. Open our hearts to the firm hope that this cross we bear may ultimately lead to the joy of the freedom from this scourge. Through Christ our Lord.

R/. Amen.

# ❖ Easter Sunday of the Lord's Resurrection – LUCERNARIUM

Where because of difficulties that may occur, a fire is not lit, the blessing of fire is adapted to the circumstances. When the people are gathered in the church as on other occasions, the Priest comes to the door of the church, along with the ministers carrying the paschal candle. The people, insofar as possible, turn to face the Priest..." (Roman Missal, Easter Vigil, 13). Small taper candles should be used, and the congregation would be asked to take them home after the celebration. If there are no Baptisms, the water is to be blessed as described in the Roman Missal in a small vessel. After the Mass, the blessed water should be stored away from the reach of the faithful. Or, as an alternative, people could be encouraged to bring their own holy water containers filled with water, and this water can be blessed at the same time. If there are to be Baptisms, the water in the font is blessed as usual, but the administration of Baptism will follow a different protocol.

# For the Baptismal Liturgy (RCIA), Baptism by immersion is not recommended at this time.

When the time for the Baptism occurs, the presider should use water from the font and pour it over the head of the Elect into a <u>separate vessel</u>, in such manner that the water that touches the person's head does not flow back into the font. It is important that the water not be recycled in this way in order to preserve a stricter hygiene than would be necessary under normal circumstances. [Note: This directive applies to the celebration of Infant Baptisms as well.]

### Celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation (RCIA)

The priest will not lay his hands on the head of each individual to be confirmed, but with his hands outstretched over the entire group he will pray in silence.

Use of "cotton balls or swabs" during the anointing at the Confirmation rite may continue. If this option is chosen, there should be a fresh cotton ball for each candidate, dipped into the Chrism, and afterwards, they should be collected in a dignified container and after the liturgy safely burned.

Priests and deacons are reminded that the anointing of the Elect with the Oil of Catechumens should take place some time PRIOR to the Easter Vigil, and not during the Easter Vigil. (Those who are already baptized, even in another Christian ecclesial community, are not catechumens and should not be anointed with the Oil of Catechumens.)



# **Re: UPDATED COVID-19 PROTOCOLS FOR CHURCH ACTIVITIES**

Date: Thu 12/2/2021

To: Pastors, Deacons, Ministry Leaders & Parish Office Staff

From: Diocesan Covid-19 Task Force

Effective December 1, 2021, all four counties in the State of Hawaii began relaxing various COVID-19 restrictions. Each county now has the authority to make their own pandemic emergency orders and rules without prior approval by the governor or the director of the Hawaii Emergency Management Agency. However, the Governor has stated that **wearing of masks indoors is still a requirement statewide**.

The protocols and guidance provided here aim to be inclusive of all – without having to disclose vaccination information – in order to encourage participation in the life of the Church while observing the safety and health guidelines set forth by the various counties. Pastors and the faithful should continue to observe sensible health precautions including continued sanitation protocols and hygiene. Thoughtful planning and communication to the parish community should precede the implementation of any changes.

In general, our activities fall under four categories: 1) Spiritual Services (Mass and other forms of public worship/liturgies), 2) Ministries, 3) Meetings, and 4) Social Gatherings.

- 1. Spiritual Services: Liturgies (Mass, prayer services, and other forms of public worship/liturgies)

There are different capacity allowances for spiritual services:

- \* Counties of O'ahu, Maui and Kaua'i: 100% church capacity allowed. Proof of vaccination not required. No physical distance requirements, although accommodations are highly recommended for those who are vulnerable to infection.
- \* Hawai'i Island County: Six feet distancing is still required. Household members may sit together, six feet away from other households/individuals.

The above capacity allowances also apply when using the church for the purpose of preparing persons to receive the sacraments.

- \* Masks: Masks must be worn at all times by all who participate at the Mass during the liturgical celebration as a mitigation effort.
- 2. Parish Ministries: In the spirit of synodality, we urge parish leaders to listen to the needs of their parishioners and find creative ways to accompany those who remain hesitant about gathering in-person for parish ministry programs. Ministries including faith formation that use school facilities must comply with applicable infectious disease prevention policies of the school. Similarly, official Associations of the Faithful (such as Catholic Scouting Committee groups) that use parish/school facilities must comply with applicable infectious disease prevention policies of their host parish/school. Associations of the Faithful are listed in the 2021 Directory of the Catholic Church in Hawaii.
- \* Masks: Masks must be worn while indoors and during interaction with others, whether indoors or outdoors. Household members may be seated together.
- \* Food: Communal food, potluck, or open food tables and group indoor dining are not permitted. Pre-packaged, take out or individual meals are suggested.
- \* Faith Formation: There are no changes to the State of Hawaii Department of Health guidelines for classroom settings. Thus, parish faith formation programs (i.e., 3 Eff. 12/2/2021 child/youth/family catechesis, catechumenal process, preparation for the sacraments, etc.) are to maintain COVID-19 processes and protocols currently in place.
- \* Ministry to the Sick and Homebound: Since this ministry includes entering private homes or health care facilities to offer the Holy Eucharist to health compromised individuals, the Church must take as many precautions as possible. This includes having a fully-vaccinated minister to visit the sick and homebound.
- \* Outreach and Food Pantries: Parishes providing outreach and food pantry ministries are to maintain COVID-19 processes and protocols currently in place.
- \* Retreats: Inquire with venue regarding capacity limits and proof of vaccination requirements. Overnight retreats are considered a high-risk activity due to prolonged exposure to attendees. If they must take place, retreat coordinators are to be conscientious regarding issues such as (but not limited to): sleeping arrangements, use and sanitization of shower facilities/bathrooms, meal service/snack and dining facilities, capacity limits and physical distancing requirements for indoor/outdoor activities and group transportation (such as chartered buses), and management of group activities such as singing, socializing, games, etc.



- 3. Parish Business or Operational Meetings (includes parish advisory councils, business meetings, facility or safety meetings, etc.) Parish business or operational meetings must follow each county's indoor and outdoor maximum restrictions. Social distancing practices should be followed and masks are required indoors.
- \* The meeting capacity maximums are as follows as of December 1, 2021:
- · O'ahu: No indoor or outdoor maximum, however must comply with vaccine/testing requirements if serving food.
- · Kaua'i: Indoor maximum 40, outdoor maximum 100
- · Maui: Indoor maximum 10, no outdoor maximum
- · Hawai'i Island: Indoor maximum 25, outdoor maximum 40 Food: Communal food, potluck, or open food tables and group indoor dining are not permitted. Pre-packaged, take out or individual meals are suggested.
- 4. Social Gatherings Hospitality and fellowship activities following liturgies, classes, presentations, meetings, etc. are classified by the counties as "social gatherings." Like parish meetings, social gathering rules also have capacity maximums: Oʻahu: No indoor or outdoor maximum, however must comply with vaccine/testing requirements if serving food. 'Kaua'i: Indoor maximum 40, outdoor maximum 100 · Maui: Indoor maximum 10, no outdoor maximum · Hawai'i Island: Indoor maximum 25, outdoor maximum 40
- \* Food: Communal food, potluck, or open food tables and group indoor dining are not permitted. Pre-packaged, take out or individual meals are suggested.

# GENERAL INFECTIOUS DISEASE PREVENTION MEASURES

- \* COVID-19 Exposure: The pastor or his delegate is to immediately report any on-site exposure to COVID-19. Call or text *Dara Perreira*, diocesan Director of Human Resources, at (808) 342-3241. *Ms. Perreira* will instruct the parish on next steps regarding quarantine and return to the workplace/ministry.
- \* Vaccinations: It is highly recommended that everyone who is eligible be fully vaccinated for COVID-19.
- \* Consistency in Practice: All employees and volunteers should know what to do when a participant is ill and be well versed with all policies, procedures, and practices regarding the parish's response to the pandemic.
- \* Signage: Post signs in highly visible locations to promote awareness of the parish's protective measures, policies, procedures, and practices such as proper hand washing, proper wearing of masks, physical distancing, and staying home when sick.
- \* Stay at Home if Sick: Educate all parents, employees, catechists, and other volunteers about the importance of staying home when sick.
- \* Checking In: Continue to screen all program participants, catechists, other volunteers, and visitors for general symptoms of illness and have a designated space for those who may need to isolate (never leave a minor unattended.) Process all persons who show signs of illness with the highest levels of confidentiality, dignity, and respect.
- \* Ventilation: When possible, open windows for greater natural air circulation.
- \* Avoid Sharing Items: Discourage the sharing of items that are difficult to clean or disinfect. Establish a cleaning schedule for all equipment, materials, and devices that must be shared.
- \* Separate Personal Items: Ensure that personal belongings are separate from others.
- \* Hand Hygiene: Encourage participants to frequently wash their hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Adequate healthy hygiene supplies/products should be available such as soap, hand sanitizer, paper towels, tissues, disinfectant wipes, and no-touch/foot-pedal trash cans.
- \* Cleaning and Disinfection: Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces such as door handles, sink handles, light switches, etc. at least daily or between use as much as possible. Provide guides and schedules of when hands should be washed, and surfaces should be cleaned. All persons should wash their hands before entering the meeting space on any occasion. Restrooms should be checked regularly to ensure soap and towel dispenser are filled.

# We Must Stop This Now: Most Extreme Abortion on Demand Bill in Congress CALL TO ACTION

On Monday, February 28, the Senate will vote on the Women's Health Protection Act, H.R. 3755. This deceptively-named, extreme bill would impose abortion on demand nationwide at any stage of pregnancy through federal statute. Even worse, it would eliminate modest and widely supported pro-life laws at every level of government -- the federal, state, and local level -- including parental notification for minor girls, informed consent, and health or safety protections specific to abortion facilities. It would force all Americans to support abortions here and abroad with their tax dollars. It would also likely force health care providers and professionals to perform, assist in, and/or refer for abortion against their deeply-held beliefs, as well as force employers and insurers to cover or pay for abortion.

We need to send an unmistakable message to the Senate that this horrible bill must never be enacted. Many pro-life organizations across the nation are unifying in strong opposition to this bill.

ACTION: The sample message provided in this alert is very short due to character limits that some senators place on emails they receive. Senator Hirono and Senator Schatz are both on record in SUPPORT of this bill but, they should still hear from you. We expect you will get a form letter response from them on why this bill is important.

Abortion is the opposite of women's health care and is an extreme violation of human rights. It has no clear justification in terms of women's health. Answering the needs of women by promoting taxpayer-funded elective abortion, as this bill would do, is a failure to love and serve women. Offering free or low-cost abortions, instead of the resources needed to care for her child, is not "choice" but coercion.

In treating abortion as the moral equivalent to the removal of an appendix, this proposal is radically out of step with the American public. I strongly urge you to reject this bill and to put the energy and resources of our federal government behind policies that recognize and support both mothers and their children.


